As a parent we want the best for our children and we want to take care of them when they are ill. However, sometimes it's not always easy to know when to keep them off school and for how long when they are sick.

So, here is some guidance to help.

Illness Guidelines

| Illness/infections | Recommended Period of absence from school | Comments/notes |
|--------------------------|---|---|
| Chickenpox | Absence from school until all the spots have crusted over. This is usually 5 days after the spots first appeared. | Can be harmful to those who are pregnant, please contact school for guidance. |
| FLU | Until recovered. | |
| German measles (rubella) | Infectious from a week before the onset of rash to 4 days afterwards. | Preventable by vaccination. Can be harmful to those who are pregnant, please contact school for |

| | Absence for four days after the rash starts to avoid infecting others. | guidance. |
|---------------------------|--|---|
| Hand, foot and mouth | None. | Contact school |
| Impetigo | Absence until spots are crusted and healed, or 48 hours after starting antibiotics. | Antibiotics speed healing and reduce the infectious period. |
| Measles | Infectious from 4 days before the onset of rash to 4 days afterwards. Absence for four days after the rash starts to avoid infecting others. | Preventable by vaccination. Can be harmful to those who are pregnant, please contact school for guidance. |
| Ringworm | Absence not usually required | Treatment is required |
| Scabies | Child can return after first treatment | Household and close contacts require treatment also. |
| Scarlet Fever | Child can return to school 24 hours after commencing antibiotic treatment | Antibiotics recommended |
| Slapped cheek | None once rash has developed | Can be harmful to those who are pregnant, please contact the school |
| Shingles | Contagious until the last blister has dried and scabbed over. | Spread by close contact and touch. Can be harmful to those who are pregnant and those not immunised from chickenpox |
| Tonsillitis | None | There are many causes, but most cases are due to viruses and do not need an antibiotic |
| Diarrhoea and/or vomiting | Return 48 hours from last episode of diarrhoea or vomiting. | Recommend visit to the GP if diarrhoea/vomiting persists |
| Whooping cough | Return 48 hours from start of antibiotics or 21 days from start of illness if no antibiotic treatment | Preventable by vaccination. After treatment non- infectious coughing may continue for many weeks |

Be assured that you child's well-being is important to us as we want every child to be happy, healthy and to learn. Please notify the school each day your child is absent due to illness—giving a valid reason rather than just saying they are unwell. If you are unsure if your child should come to school please contact the school office. Tel 01304 374464

Holidays

If your child is away from school for any reason it will have an impact on their learning. **HOLIDAYS SHOULD NOT BE TAKEN IN SCHOOL TIME**. If you do take a holiday during term time, this may result in the Local Authority issuing a Penalty Notice (fine) ie. If your child has 10 sessions or more unauthorised within 100 sessions. (1 session = 1 morning or 1 afternoon)

Penalty Notices are issued to **each parent** of **each child** and the amount of the fine will be £120 to be paid within 28 days, reduced to £60 if paid within 21 days. Failure to pay the fine in full at the end of the 28 day period may result in prosecution by the Attendance Service. Myth Buster: The money you pay as a fine does **not** go to the school.

Why is it important for your child to attend school regularly?

- It gives your child the best possible start to life
- They will be able to keep up with their learning
- They will have a better future employment
- They will be at less risk of becoming a victim of crime
- They will be less likely to become involved in anti-social behavior
- It is the law.

<u>Why is it important for your child to be punctual?</u> - Persistent lateness can be legally counted as unauthorised absence, which can...

- Cause disruption to the rest of the class
- Cause embarrassment to the child
- Make it harder for the child to settle as they may have missed vital instructions

Being 15 minutes late each day during an entire school year is the same as missing two whole weeks of school!
